PENFIELD STREET RECONSTRUCTION INCHING CLOSER TO REALITY

What was designed in 2013 will finally happen in 2022

This project has been on the drawing board for seven years now as the Village satisfies all of the federal and state requirements in order to obtain the \$4 million in Federal Surface Transportation funds necessary to complete the project. Bid opening is scheduled to occur on January 21st with construction beginning in March of 2022 when the Penfield Street bridge will be replaced. A new parking lot will also be installed on the vacant lot east of the post office.

Penfield will be closed between the grade school drive and Maxwell Street for several months. Following the replacement of the bridge, the south half of Penfield will be totally reconstructed from Reed Street east to Dixie Highway. The new parking lot will be for post office parking during that time and two-way traffic will be allowed in the "post office alley" during this period. The north half of Penfield will be for westbound traffic only (one way). When that portion of the road is complete, work will begin on the north half of the street and traffic will be allowed to go eastbound only (one way). The Village will also be working out the details of a traffic plan with the Fire and School Districts since this will drastically affect their operations.

Reconstruction of the road includes replacing all public sidewalks, curbing, decorative street lighting, new storm sewers and reconfiguration from pull-in to parallel parking in several locations. The watermains were already replaced as a separate project in 2017. It will be a challenging year for all of us during construction, but finished product will be worth the inconvenience and the wait.


There are currently three full Commissioner positions open and several ex-officio positions. Please contact the Village Hall if you are interested in serving on the Commission.

ILLIANA CROSSROADS BUSINESS PARK PROPOSED Concept is approved but more details require consideration

On August 9th the Village Board approved an exploratory proposal (concept plan) for the Illiana Crossroads Business Park of Beecher submitted by Art VanBaren of Dutch American Foods. This proposed development is bounded by Church Road on the north, the Union Pacific railroad tracks to the west. Miller Street and Willow Lane to the south, and Catalpa Street and Dixie Highway to the east. This project still requires preliminary plan and final plat approvals.

The concept plan calls for approximately 51 one acre lots for smaller businesses. These lots, similar to the Trim Creek Business Park north of Church Road, can be purchased in bundles for larger buildings. The project will be marketed mainly for warehousing and light manufacturing which will all occur indoors. No outside storage will be allowed. Additionally, 49 acres will be reserved for detention of storm water and open space.

The Village is requiring a traffic and road condition study for Church Road to determine the impact of the proposed park and has also initiated a report on how local property values will be affected. Other covenants intended to reduce the impact of the proposed



park to adjoining residential property are also under review. If the project is fully approved, the first phase will begin in the northwest corner of the property along the railroad tracks. Several businesses similar to Dutch American Foods have expressed an interest in the park.

MEET THE VILLAGE'S INTERIM CHIEF OF POLICE

In August the Village welcomed Terry Lemming as its interim Chief of Police as the search process begins for a new full-time Chief of Police. Greg Smith retired as Chief from the department at the end of July. Terry comes to us from the City of Lockport where he has served as Chief since 2013 and retired in early August. Prior to that he served as a Lieutenant Colonel for the Illinois State Police where he served 25 years.

Chief Lemming was contracted through the Illinois Chiefs of Police Association as a "linebacker" to assist municipalities in managing their police departments in times of transition.



Have you heard about the Beecher Emergency Management Agency?

The Beecher Emergency Management Agency or EMA is a group of volunteers who assist the Beecher Police Department, Beecher Fire Protection District and Beecher Department of Public Works in several ways. Our main duties include traffic control and crowd supervision. We are often seen directing traffic in case of accidents, water main breaks and special events. There have been occasions where we have assisted with searching for missing persons. We also have trained weather spotters who keep their eyes to the sky during severe weather. In the event of a natural disaster, we may participate in search and rescue of homes and other areas hit by severe weather. It's not always work for us though! We do enjoy a parade!

The EMA team has training in CPR/AED, Community Emergency Response Team Training, National Safety Council Flagger Training, and Illinois Department of Transportation Traffic Incident Management Training. We continue to train several times a year to keep our certifications and knowledge current.

Some of our team members have backgrounds in the military, police, fire, and EMT/Paramedic careers.

The Beecher EMA team includes Bob Heim, Director, Deputy Directors Denis Tatgenhorst and Dale Murray. EMA officers incude Joe Cackowski, Sherry Murray, Laura Voss, Shawn Giggey and Corey Cross.

VILLAGE BOARD MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

The following actions were taken by the Beecher Village Board since March of 2021.

- ✓ Approved a grant application in the amount of \$4.4 million to the Illinois EPA for the replacement of all the lead service lines in the Village. Awarded a contract for same to the lowest bidder: Brandt Excavating of Morris, Illinois.
- ✓ Approved a donation in the amount of \$15,000 from COVID CARES grant funds to the Beecher Fourth of July Commission to assist them in paying for the fireworks show this year.
- ✓ Declared two Dodge Charger police vehicles and 2 Humvees as surplus property.
- ✓ Approved the purchase of a used 2017 Ford Taurus police pursuit vehicle in the amount of \$19,000 using the proceeds from the sale of surplus property. At this time no new squads were available for sale.
- ✓ Approved a new 10 year agreement with Comcast Cable for use of rights of way.
- ✓ Extended an agreement with Carl Smits for the disposal of leaves at his composting site through 2028.
- ✓ Approved a five year agreement with UIOE Local #399 for the clerical workers.
- ✓ Approved a drainage easement agreement with Ron and Jamie Anderson for a swale though a field at 11 W. Church Road.
- ✓ Approved a budget and appropriation ordinance for FY 21/22.
- ✓ Adopted resolutions thanking former Village President Greg Szymanski (6 years as Trustee, 8 years as Village President,) for his service and Trustees Scott Wehling (24 years) and Stacy Mazurek (4 years) for their service.
- ✓ Authorized the purchase of splash pad equipment from Landscape Structures in the amount of \$87,380.80; the installation of electrical and water service to M+J Underground in the amount of \$19,851.70 and George's Landscaping in the amount of \$147,187.00 for the installation of the splash pad in Firemen's Park. The Board also learned that due to delays in work schedules and getting materials, the splash pad will not be opened until the Spring of 2022.
- ✓ Approved a variance for a fence in the front yard setback at 320 Mallards Cove.
- ✓ Approved a proposal from JMA Architects in the amount of \$8,000 to conduct a feasibility study for a new police station.
- ✓ Approved the lowest proposal from McGill Paving in the amount of \$88,315.44 for the 2021 resurfacing program which included portions of Fox Hound Trail, Church Road east of Cardinal Creek Boulevard and Park Drive.

Board Meeting Highlights Continued

- ✓ Authorized the power washing of the elevated tank on Gould Street For \$6,500; inspection of the above ground tank on Church Road for \$2,775; the purchase of a Spartan zero turn mower for \$11,000; installation of a generator at the Public Works garage for \$3,100; and the purchase of a golf cart for use at the sewer plant of \$2,500.
- ✓ Approved the appointment of Joe Gianotti as Trustee to fill the unexpired term of Marcy Meyer who was elected Village President.
- ✓ Authorized the purchase of a 2011 tandem axle International 7500 dump truck in the amount of \$58,000 for the Public Works Department. This will become the largest truck in the snow removal fleet.
- ✓ Approved a one year contract with Eligo Energy as the Village's power supplier through the residential aggregation program on the premise that the energy supplied would be 100% green.
- ✓ Approved an ordinance requiring all contractors performing work in the Village over \$100,000 prove compliance upon request of the Village with State and federal payroll tax laws.
- ✓ Approved an exploratory proposal for a business park located south of Church Road and east of the Union Pacific Railroad tracks. This approval allows the petitioner to engineer the project and provide the necessary details for further consideration.
- ✓ Learned that a demolition order has been made for 648 Penfield Street. The Village is working with Fannie Mae, the new legal owner of the property, on the home's rehabilitation or demolition. Since it is a federal program several steps need to be taken before action can occur on the property.
- ✓ Approved the hiring of John Henson, Brandon Gereg, Anthony Gonsiorowski and Ronald Emery replacing employees who are no longer with the Public Works Department.
- ✓ Approved four year employment agreements with Robert Barber, Village Administrator, Janett Conner, Village Clerk/Office Manager, and Matt Conner, Superintendent of Public Works.
- ✓ Learned that Police Chief Greg Smith would retire at the end of his contract term on July 30th.
- ✓ Approved a six month agreement with Terry Lemming as interim Chief of Police as the process begins to find a new Chief.
- ✓ Learned that the railroad quiet zone went into effect on July 14th. Some trains will continue to sound their horns if the engineer believes a safety hazard exists.
- ✓ Referred a request for an appeal to the Village's building code requiring a fire suppression (sprinkler) system for 610 Gould Street.
- ✓ Approved an agreement with the State of Illinois for sharing sales tax information.
- ✓ Learned that the Village's official 2020 Census population is 4,713; 354 higher than the 2010 count of 4,359.
- ✓ Approved a temporary special use for a tent to be used to store golf carts at Cardinal Creek Golf course.
- ✓ Approved the appointments of Kristin Tucker, Codi Killis, Jessica Smith, Kelly Weissbohn, and Hebah Arroyo to the Beecher Youth Commission.

PLEASE KEEP GUTTERS AND STREET DRAINS CLEAR TO PREVENT FLOODING

As the leaves fall, protect your home from storm water flow by cleaning your house gutters and the street drains. It takes a surprisingly small event to cause serious damage when the storm drain

surprisingly small event to cause serious damage when the storm drain is blocked. Leaves break down quickly when mowed or placed in a compost pile.

Storm drains are the metal grates that are found on streets, often at corners and on the sides of curbs and gutters. The purpose of the **storm drain** is to help prevent flooding by diverting rainwater and melted snow off of the streets and other paved surfaces and into a natural body To learn more or report possible illegal discharges to the storm drain system, call the Village of Beecher at 708-946-2261.

BE THE SOLUTION TO STORMWATER POLLUTION

As stormwater flows over driveways, lawns, and sidewalks, it picks up debris, chemicals, dirt, and other pollutants. Stormwater can flow into a storm sewer system or directly to a lake, stream, river or wetland. Anything that enters a storm sewer system is discharged untreated into the waterbodies we use for swimming, fishing, and drinking water. Polluted runoff is the nation's greatest threat to clean water.



By practicing healthy household habits, homeowners can keep common pollutants like pesticides, pet waste, grass clippings, and automotive fluids off the ground and out of stormwater. Adopt these healthy household habits and help protect lakes, streams, rivers, and wetlands. Remember to share the habits with your neighbors!




BRUSH COLLECTION PROGRAM TO CONTINUE THROUGH NOVEMBER

Brush pick-up will continue <u>every Tuesday</u> through November, and begin again in April, 2022. Please remember to follow brush pick-up rules which can be found on the Village website to ensure your brush is collected. Brush will not be picked up during the winter months unless there is a storm and then the crews will go out on an as-needed basis.

DOG TAGS GO ON SALE WEDNESDAY, DECEMBER 1ST

Dog tags go on sale Wednesday, December 1st. The price is \$10 per dog and the deadline for purchase is March 15, 2022. After the March 15th deadline, the price of dog tags increase. **Tags may be purchased at the Village Hall or online by clicking on the "EPay" option on the Village website.** The dog's name, breed, color and date of last rabies vaccination will be required to purchase the tag. If you pay online, the tags will be mailed to you.





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BE AWARE OF SNOW PARKING REGULATIONS DURING WINTER WEATHER

With winter approaching, the Village wants to remind residents that for a period of twenty-four (24) hours after a snowfall of two inches or more, it is illegal to park on any residential Village street or in any business district public parking space commonly maintained by the Village between the hours of 1:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. This includes curbed streets and driving lanes but does not include parkways maintained by residents. It is also illegal to deposit snow onto public streets. When clearing your driveway, direct the snow into the yard and not the street. Remember, the snow will end up back in your driveway anyway when the plow comes back by! The Police Department may issue tickets to those that deposit their snow onto the street.



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CURBSIDE LEAF COLLECTION



The cooler weather has arrived and leaf raking season is here again! Leaves raked in rows along the curbside are picked up by a large vacuum machine used by Public Works crews until the end of November (depending on the weather).

Residents should place leaves in a pile or row in the parkway, between the sidewalk and curb as near to the street as possible. Leaves should not be placed in the streets because it will clog storm drains when it rains, potentially causing flooding. In areas without curbs, leaves should be placed in long rows on the grass or parkway at the edge of the street. Do not mix leaves with branches or grass clippings. These things will damage the leaf machine.
